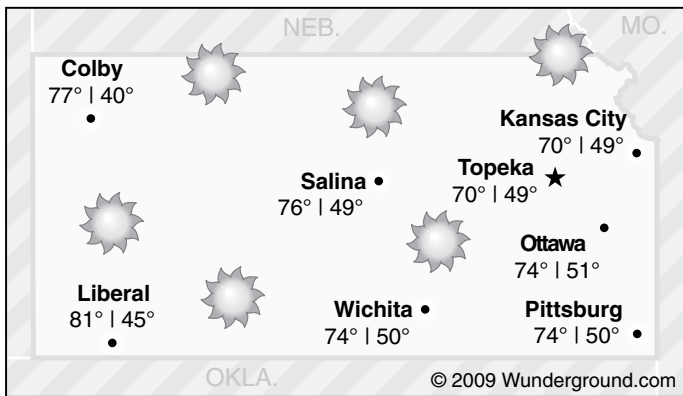

# Police: Traffic stop nets drugs, ammo

An Ottawa man was expected to appear before a judge today after a traffic stop resulted in his arrest on drug-related charges. Dustin Thomas Markus, 31, was arrested Wednesday evening in Ottawa on suspicion of drug-related offenses, criminal use of a weapon and endangering a child. A detective attempted to stop

Markus for traffic violations when the vehicle apparently attempted to elude the detective, Franklin County Sheriff Craig Davis said. Another law enforcement officer intercepted the vehicle at Seventh and Cedar streets, Davis said. Officers found a small amount of what appeared to be marijuana, drug paraphernalia, a substance believed to be methamphetamine

and ammunition in the vehicle, Davis said. Another adult and a 14-year-old girl also were in the vehicle, he said. Markus was arrested on suspicion of endangering a child, criminal use of a weapon, possession of drugs with intent to sell, no drug tax stamp and possession of drug paraphernalia.

# Stalking case headed to trial next year

An Ottawa man accused of stalking an Ottawa woman will face a jury trial next year.

Dale Moore, 48, will face a two-day jury trial starting at 9 a.m. April 6 at Franklin County District Court.

Moore, former general manager at Wal-Mart Distribution Center, ap-

peared in court for his preliminary hearing earlier this week, where he pleaded not guilty to the stalking charges.

According to court documents, an Ottawa woman filed a petition for protection against stalking in September against Moore, who allegedly followed the woman from work and followed her friends, coworkers and

husband over the course of three years. That petition was granted by Judge Magistrate Kevin Kimball in October.

During Moore's hearing last week, his lawyer, Ronald Ryburn requested modifications to Moore's bond, which currently requires the use of electronic monitoring.

Moore's lawyer asked Judge Thomas Sachse to

remove the electronic monitoring requirement from the bond conditions so Moore could pursue another job. Sachse will decide about the bond conditions during a telephone conference Nov. 30.

Moore was discharged from his previous job because of the allegations against him, court documents say.

### Flags ordered to half-staff

Gov. Mark Parkinson has directed flags across Kansas to fly at half-staff from now until sundown Nov. 14 in recognition of the death of former Kansas Gov. William H. Avery.

"Gov. Avery led our state during a time of tragic loss and national attention. Kansas honors his long life and service to our state. Our thoughts and prayers are with his children and family," Parkinson said.

It is Kansas policy for the flag to be flown at half-staff upon the death of a governor or former governor, until burial, which is planned for Nov. 14 for Avery.

Avery was elected to one term as governor in 1964.

A Republican, Avery also was elected to the Kansas House of Representatives in 1950 and served to 1955.

In 1954, he was elected to the U.S. House of Representatives and served 10 years.

### COF consumers to graduate program

Bryan Barrett and Theren Weidner, both consumers at COF Training Services Inc. in Ottawa, will graduate this weekend from Partners in Policymaking, a program for adults with disabilities and parents of children with disabilities.

The graduation is scheduled for 1 p.m. Saturday at the Ramada Inn, Topeka.

Earlier this year, the pair worked locally through the program to update reserved parking signs to remove words like "disabled" and "handicapped." Some signs now only have the international symbol for people with disabilities.

### H1N1 vaccine clinic planned Tuesday

H1N1 vaccine will be available at a clinic from 4 p.m. to 7 p.m. or until supplies run out Thursday at Celebration Hall at the Franklin County Fairgrounds, 1737 S. Elm St.

The vaccine is available only in the injection form and will be offered only to high-risk groups, including:

- Pregnant women.
- Health care workers.
- Caregivers of children younger than 6 months, including parents, day care staff and siblings.

- Children from 6 months to 24 years.
- Anyone ages 24 to 64 with underlying health conditions.

During this time, no other services or immunizations will be available at the Franklin County Health Department.

### OU student to speak on experiences working as Red Cross intern
